Statement of Intent

This policy has been created with health and safety, value for money, and practicality at its heart.

At Moor Park High School and Sixth Form we believe that school uniform is important in ensuring that children, whatever their background or circumstances, feel an equal part of the school community. We also believe that a smart, well-presented uniform indicates a willingness to comply with school rules and is good preparation for learning.

The uniform items fulfil the criteria of clothing that is suitable, comfortable, affordable, practical and purposeful for an effective learning and teaching setting in a safe and healthy environment. We also believe it is important for activities to be facilitated by specialised and appropriate clothing such as sports specific attire.

Moor Park High School and Sixth Form is committed to promoting equality and value for money and ensuring that no pupil is discriminated against due to their protective characteristics; religion or belief, economic circumstances or social and cultural background – this policy contains provisions to meet these objectives.

For the purposes of this policy, **“uniform”** includes the following elements of pupils’ appearance:

- Clothing, including the school uniform itself, variations of the school uniform such as PE kits, and other clothing worn at school, e.g. non-uniform.
- Hairstyles and headwear.
- Jewellery and other accessories.
- Cosmetics such as makeup and nail polish.

This policy has due regard to statutory legislation and national guidance, including, but not limited to, the following:

Aims

Through our uniform and dress code we aim to:

- Encourage pride in the school and ourselves
- Support teaching and learning

- Enable pupils to be comfortable, safe and secure
- Encourage a sense of equality and belonging to the school community
- Protect pupils from social pressures to dress in a particular way
- Support parents to provide an efficient and value for money dress code for their children
- Ensure that pupils from different social, religious and ethnic groups feel welcome.

Roles and Responsibilities

The Headteacher is responsible for:

- Establishing, in consultation with the Governing Body and school community, a practical and smart school uniform that accurately reflects the school's vision and values.
- Ensuring that the school's uniform is accessible, inclusive, and does not disadvantage any pupil because of their protected characteristics or socio-economic status.
- Listening to the opinions and wishes of parents, pupils and the wider school community regarding changes to the school's uniform.
- Ensuring that the school's uniform is accessible and affordable.
- Demonstrating in this policy how best value for money has been achieved.
- Ensuring compliance with the DfE's 'Cost of school uniforms' guidance.

The Deputy Headteacher is responsible for:

- Enforcing the school's uniform rules on a day-to-day basis.
- Ensuring that teachers understand this policy and what to do if a pupil is in breach of the policy.
- Listening to the opinions and wishes of the school community in regard to the school's uniform and making appropriate recommendations.
- Providing pupils with an exemption letter as appropriate, e.g. for a pupil who has a broken arm and requires a loose-fitting shirt.

Staff are responsible for:

- Ensuring that pupils dress in accordance with this policy at all times.
- Where appropriate to their role, disciplining pupils who are in breach of this policy.
- Ensuring that pupils understand why having a consistent and practical school uniform is important, e.g. school identity.

Parents are responsible for:

- Providing their children with the correct school uniform as detailed in this policy.
- Informing the school if their child requires an exemption to the uniform rules for a period of time, with a reason why.
- Ensuring that their child's uniform is clean, presentable and the correct size.

Pupils are responsible for:

- Wearing the correct uniform at all times, unless the school has granted an exemption.
- Looking after their uniform as appropriate.
- Understanding and respecting why a school uniform is important to the school, e.g. school identity and community.

Cost Principles

In accordance with the 'School Admissions Code', the headteacher will ensure that the school's uniform requirements do not discourage parents from applying for a place for their child.

The school will not make frequent changes to uniform requirements and will take the views of parents and pupils into account when considering any changes.

The school has met the DfE's requirements and recommendations on costs and value for money. Care has been taken to ensure that school uniform is affordable for all current and prospective pupils, and that the best value for money is secured through reputable suppliers.

The school has kept branded uniform items to a minimal level that is reasonable for all members of the school community.

The school will assess the overall cost implications of its uniform policy annually, including prior to making any changes to the school uniform. When evaluating whether costs are reasonable and proportionate, the school will take into account the opinions and situations of:

- Economically disadvantaged parents.
- Parents with multiple children who are, or will be in the future, pupils at the school.
- Parents of younger children, as they are likely to grow quickly and require new sets of uniform more frequently.
- Parents of pupils with protected characteristics that may impact their ability to access the uniform.
- LAC and PLAC.

Equality Principles

The school takes its legal obligation to avoid unlawfully discriminating against any protected characteristic very seriously. In line with this, the school will aim to ensure that its uniform policy is as inclusive as possible so that all pupils can access a school uniform which is comfortable, suitable for their needs, and reflects who they are, while avoiding any direct or indirect discrimination on the basis of protected characteristics or socio-economic status.

In determining the uniform and any changes that might follow the governors will seek the views of:

- The Headteacher
- Parents
- Staff
- Pupils (where appropriate)
- The LA (where appropriate)

The views of all stakeholders will be considered and taken into account.

Parents' concerns and requests regarding school uniform and amendments to it are handled on a case-by-case basis by the headteacher and deputy, and always in accordance with the school's Complaints Procedures Policy.

Information on how the school ensures its uniform policy does not discriminate against pupils with specific protected characteristics is outlined below:

Gender:

Moor Park High School & Sixth Form has a gender-neutral uniform policy. Pupils may wear any of the uniform listed in the school uniform section of this policy.

Religion & Belief:

Some religions and beliefs require their members to conform to a specific dress code. Moor Park does not discriminate against any religion or belief; however, the school must weigh the needs and rights of individual pupils against the cohesion and health and safety concerns of the entire school community. The school endeavours to allow most religious requirements to be met.

Parents' concerns and requests regarding religious clothing are dealt with on a case-by-case basis by the Headteacher / Deputy Headteacher.

Race:

To avoid disproportionately impacting pupils of a certain race, the school will ensure that its uniform policy does not constitute unlawful indirect discrimination through blanket rules. This includes:

- Not banning hairstyles related to a pupil's ethnic origin, e.g. natural Afro hairstyles.
- Not banning hairstyles worn because of cultural, family and social customs, e.g. cornrows.
- Not banning head coverings related to a pupil's culture or ethnic origin, e.g. African heritage head wraps.

The school will follow the good practice guidance provided by the Equality and Human Rights Commission on '[Preventing hair discrimination in schools](#)'.

SEND and Medical Conditions:

To avoid disproportionately impacting pupils with SEND or medical conditions, the school will ensure its uniform policy takes into account the needs of these pupils.

Where the needs of these pupils cannot be met in the standard uniform policy, individual adaptations to the uniform will be considered and permitted wherever possible.

Enforcement of the Policy

- It is the responsibility of the Deputy Headteacher through the staff to monitor and enforce the uniform as part of the day to day running of the school.
- Parents have the responsibility to ensure that their child comes to school in the correct uniform.
- The school's behaviour management policy, 'The Moor Park Way' states that pupils agree to wear full uniform at all time.
- The school takes pride in pupils looking smart, therefore full school uniform must be worn on both the journey to and from school as well as in school.
- No modifications to the uniform are allowed.
- Pupils arriving to school in incorrect uniform, or those who are seen during the day not complying with the uniform policy will be issued with a same day "uniform detention". This is a 30-minute detention, which can be increased to 1 hour for persistent offenders.
- Pupils who fail to attend in full school uniform **may briefly** be sent home to change into correct uniform. Parents/Carers will be notified in all cases.

- Persistent non-compliance with regards to school uniform regulations will be dealt with according to the schools Behaviour Management Policy and may result in sanctions including, confiscation of jewellery or make-up, seclusions and fixed term suspensions.
- The school requests that parents/carers contact school and let us know if there are any problems with their child's uniform. This will allow school to work with parents/carers and resolve any issues promptly.

- As part of presenting themselves daily and smartly pupils are not allowed to graffiti school uniform or any part of their body, sleeves with pens/markers etc.

Complaints

Any complaints about school uniform must be made in the first instance to the Headteacher. If the complaint is not satisfactorily resolved the complaint should be brought to the attention of the governing body through the complaint's procedures.

Parents are advised to ensure that all pupils' clothing and footwear is clearly labelled with their name and year group. Any lost clothing will be taken to the lost property box in the **school office**. All lost property will be retained for **one month** and will be disposed of if it is not collected within this time.

MPHSSF guidelines in support of wearing safeguarding ID/Lanyard

Why do we have Lanyards?

- The Moor Park High School Lanyard fully supports the implementation of the Safeguarding and Child Protection policy and is committed to Safeguarding its Staff, Students and Visitors.
- The ID lanyard allows staff & students to notice immediately that individuals are registered as part of the Moor Park High School community. For this reason, every person on the school site is expected to always wear their lanyard with Identity card
- All stakeholders have identified coloured ID Lanyard that allows them access to areas of the building. Staff, members of the governing body and external visitors that have DBS clearance can move through the building unaccompanied. External visitors without DBS must be accompanied by staff at all times.

What do the Student Lanyards do?

- Indicate what year group a child is in. Each year group has a clear card with the pupils ID and a different coloured lanyard
- They have the QR codes for purchasing food in the canteen
- They indicate whether pupils are on home lunches
- They indicate if a pupil has a medical pass to use the toilets
- They indicate if a pupil has permission to attend religious observation on Friday.

When do Students have to wear the Lanyard?

- The ID lanyards must be worn around the neck, on the front of the body, on the outermost clothing and properly display a current Moor Park High School ID Card.
- In the classroom, there may be situations, where a teacher allows students to remove their ID lanyards temporarily to complete a classroom activity (i.e. practical lessons)

What happens if a student does not have their lanyard?

- Students ID card and lanyard are treated as part of the school uniform. If pupils do not have their Lanyard they may be sent home to collect it. Uniform detentions will also be issued in this case.
- Without a lanyard it is not possible to pay for lunch, at busy times pupils that have forgotten their lanyard may have to wait until the end of their year groups allocated lunchtime for their details to be located by canteen staff.

What if the Lanyard is lost or damaged?

- The school provides every student a school lanyard and ID free of charge when they join the school
- It is the student's responsibility to immediately report their ID card as lost or damaged and to replace it promptly. Students will be charged for a replacement.
- The ID card will cost £4. Replacements can be obtained from the School office. Payment must be made through the online ParentMail.
- Students in receipt of Free School Meals will receive one free replacement ID card and lanyard if their card is lost. Deliberately damaged Lanyards will not be replaced free of charge.
- If your ID card fails to operate at lunchtime home pass, it will be replaced free of charge
- ID cards and lanyards are school property; they must be returned when no longer required

Sixth Form Dress Code

The aim of having a Sixth Form dress code is to encourage Sixth Form pupils to dress appropriately for the school environment now that they no longer need to wear school uniform. Although we want Sixth Formers to feel comfortable at school, we also want to ensure that you retain an image that reflects a successful school.

A pupil's appearance is not only important in maintaining high standards but is also good preparation for the world of work - where appropriate dress is an expectation. This may mean that pupils need to dress differently to how they dress when not at Sixth Form.

Sixth Form pupils form part of the adult community at Moor Park High School and Sixth Form and as such are expected to dress accordingly. Alongside the freedom of choosing what to wear comes a responsibility to act as role models to the younger pupils.

Ideally pupils should wear clothes that would be appropriate in an office environment. However smart casual dress is allowed. The points below outline more specifically what is and is not acceptable for pupils to wear in the Sixth Form:

It is hoped that sixth form pupils will be sensible and self regulating in the choice of clothing that they wear to school. Pupils will be informed if their choice of dress falls outside the spirit of the code. However, if dress is considered inappropriate then the pupil will be asked to go home to change into more appropriate clothing.

'Non uniform' Events

If pupils are not expected to wear uniform because of a charity event or because they are on a trip their clothing should be appropriate for the working environment/activities that they are taking part in.

In line with the dress code in the sixth form the following points should be noted:

It is hoped that pupils will be sensible and self regulating in the choice of clothing that they wear on “non-uniform days”. Pupils will be informed if their choice of dress falls outside the spirit of the code. However, if dress is considered inappropriate then the pupil concerned will be asked to go home to change into more appropriate clothing.
